





Strong Commitment Pays Dividends to All Members

"Originally formed in 1984 by a number of System/38 users and with IBM's help, LISUG has become one of the largest and most technical user groups in the country". So says the home page of the Long Island System Users Group, whose current board of directors includes IBM Business Partners, business owners, educators, and no fewer than four COMMON speakers. The board's commitment and dedication are just two words that can describe LISUG's longevity, and how it manages to survive and thrive serving the needs of the Long Island / New York City IT community.

**User Group**: LISUG, or Long Island System Users Group

**Founded:** 1984. As part of its 20<sup>th</sup> year anniversary last year, all renewing members received a laptop bag with the LISUG insignia. Originally focusing on IBM's System/38, LISUG has been re-chartered to advance the knowledge of all computer users on all platforms.

Location: Nassau and Suffolk counties constitute Long Island, nearly 1200 square miles. Membership reaches beyond that, however, given LISUG's immediate proximity to New York City.

Membership: The group's mailing list contains over 300 names, with approximately 50 active members. While anyone may attend a meeting, current members are eligible for a discounted monthly meeting fee. Membership is renewed annually, starting in May.

Funding: The group is funded primarily through membership dues and monthly meeting fees. The first-time member registration fee is \$100, and annual renewal is \$50. The membership fee is pro-rated monthly, starting in June. The dinner fee is \$50 for members, \$65 for non-members. A pre-paid yearly membership is available for \$500, which includes all meetings and the yearly membership fee.

Meetings: LISUG meets on the third Wednesday of every month except for July and August. Each May a full-day "course of study" is offered, where attendees receive a track of related topics. The monthly meeting format has remained largely unchanged, with a registration/networking cocktail hour, a dinner hour accompanied with interactive Q and A, and usually one to two hours for the featured speaker. Working in conjunction with two nearby user groups, the consortium attracts some of the industry's top speakers, including specialists from IBM's Rochester and Toronto Labs. Recent topics have included i5/OS updates, iSeries Access for Web, and LPAR Ato-Z.

Recently, LISUG introduced a series of double meetings, with "two for the price of one" pricing. Essentially, a second presentation was added at the beginning of the monthly meeting agenda, with entirely different content designed to attract IT managers, and non-technical professionals.

"These have proven to be very successful, and we're learning more each time we hold these events," says Al Barsa, President of LISUG. "The double meeting concept provides an opportunity to expand our membership, as well as enhance our offerings to current members." The first two double-meeting topics were "Sarbanes-Oxley and HIPAA Compliance," and "RF and RFID Wireless Technology for the iSeries." Additional double meeting dates are already scheduled, as there appears to be no shortage of worthy topics.

**Volunteers:** A board of directors meeting is held one week after each general meeting, with planning including future meeting topics, banking, and arranging for speakers. All members are welcome to attend a board meeting.

New board members are brought in from the existing membership pool, generally nominated by a board member. Indeed, the composition and camaraderie of the board is what sustains the group, and is clearly attributable to its success. With each member respectfully given equal opportunity to participate, topics remain current and timely.
