The meeting itself will start at 6:30, with a brief presentation about the state of the iSeries (which ought to be interesting given the recent announcement!) from John Reed, Director of iSeries Product Development and Business Operations. Then Al Barsa will present the featured topic, It's About Time, a summary of the new time management support added in V5R3.

Presentation: It's About Time


Come hear Al Barsa discuss the newly added time support for OS/400 in V5R3. Topics will include automated changes, automatic transformation of the system internal clock from local time to UTC (with no change to your normal operations), multiple time zone support, automated daylight savings time and other time adjustments. This is the first of two stages of enhancement to time support, with a later stage occurring in a subsequent release.

Speakers:

John Reed -- John holds a Bachelor's Degree in Mechanical Engineering from Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa. John began his IBM career in Rochester, Minnesota in December of 1983 as an engineer in Manufacturing. While in Manufacturing, John held several technical and management positions including managing the Systems Manufacturing lines. John then joined the iSeries (then AS/400) product management team in 1998. He was the project executive responsible for delivery of V4R5 and the industry's first introduction of silicon on insulator (SOI) technology. John also managed the transition of the AS/400 product line to eServer iSeries. John is currently the Director of Product Management and Business Operations for the IBM iSeries server. John's organization is responsible for product positioning, strategic product requirements and direction, and product launch and marketing for the iSeries product line.

Al Barsa -- Al Barsa, Jr. is President of Barsa Consulting Group, LLC and Barsa Systems Distribution, Inc, which specialize in the i5 - iSeries - AS/ 400. Al is the President of the Long Island Systems User Group and covers new hardware and software announcements for iSeriesNews. Al is very active in the COMMON organization as a frequent speaker at both US COMMON and COMMON Europe, as an Editor of the COMMON technical library and as a member of the Speaker Excellence Committee, and has addressed other user groups throughout the world. In the past, Al has been voted COMMON's Best Speaker", won Gold, Silver and Bronze medals, and has received COMMON's highest honor, the COMMON Distinguished Service Award.

For the year ending 2002 and in six prior years, Al was named on the 'AS/ 400 Insider Weekly's' "10 Biggest AS/ 400 Market Influencers" list, making him the only person in the world ever to be named seven times!

New COMMON Member Benefit Announced

COMMON Member Directory to Debut

Soon you'll be able to connect with your fellow COMMON members across the country – and around the world – to get answers to your IT questions, follow up on a conference discussion, or network between conferences. The COMMON Online Member Directory will be launched soon and will create an entire new community within COMMON – a community you can turn to for advice and support year round and 24/7.

Here's how the directory will work:

Step 1: Populating the Directory

By now, all active COMMON members (including Local User Group representatives) have been contacted via email with a request to provide their information for the Online Member Directory. Only active members will be included in the Directory. Note that "active members" include individual, corporate, and Local Users Group members who have paid their membership dues for 2005.

If you wish to participate in the directory, either by providing your information for others to access or by searching for members, and you didn't receive the email notification, please check with your Local User Group representative. In order for individual LUG members to participate, their LUG must have a current COMMON membership, and must have provided the names of all individual members to COMMON so we can provide each with an ID number to sign up for the directory.

Only those people who enter their demographic information into the Web interface will be included. Members who choose not to be included, or who neglect to provide their information, will not appear in the Online Member Directory.

Step 2: Searching the Directory

Once the member directory is populated with enough members, COMMON will make the tool available to all active members. (Note that you'll need to know your COMMON ID and password to access the directory.) When you use the directory, you can search by one or a combination of the following criteria:

- First and last name
- City, state and/or country
- Type of software used (25 choices)
- Industry
- Functional responsibility
- Title

Step 3: Contacting Another Member

Say you have a question about installing Lotus Notes; you can query the member directory to find an IT manager who's already using that application. You can even search for someone in your immediate area if you want to suggest meeting in person.

Once you find the COMMON member you want to contact, you can click on an anonymous email link. The sender can't see or access email addresses (or mailing addresses) in the directory, and the email is sent through the online form, so all directory participants can enjoy their privacy until they respond to an inquiry.

The COMMON Online Member Directory is easy to use and it will be updated dynamically. Join it today, by providing your own professional information, and soon you can connect with IT professionals with similar interests and problems – and maybe get the answers you need to face your next challenge.

Renew Your Membership So You Can Participate

If you're interested in taking part in the new Online Member Directory, but your LUG's COMMON membership has lapsed, it's easy to renew. There's a link on www.common.org under "Become a COMMON member ... or renew your membership" that allows you to renew or join online. You can also download a PDF to print out, fill out and return. Or you can call COMMON's membership team at 800.270.8223 or 312.279.0192.

Note that individual LUG members can participate in the directory only if COMMON has their names on file. Your LUG representative must provide COMMON with a list of all current members in order for those members to be given ID numbers.

However you decide to renew your membership, as soon as your information is processed you will be eligible to participate in the directory.



Notes from the Field

- The Grumpy Old Programmer

Editors's note: On February 24th, IBM made an announcement that may well have been the most significant iSeries announcement in a decade (at least that's what they said!). I was going to just give you the highlights, but given the fact that we try to be an equal opportunity newsletter, we've decided to let one of our, um, **stodgier** members chime in. Please welcome The Grumpy Old Programmer.

Biggest announcement my foot. Removing the MOVE opcode, now *that* was a big announcement. Getting rid of WebSphere 3.5 Standard Edition, replacing it with Tomcat, and then removing support for Tomcat, *that* was a big announcement. This is more hoopla. Hot air. Blowing smoke.

And given the history of the iSeries "marketing" efforts from IBM, we might agree if it weren't for the fact that the following Monday IBM published a **4-page spread** in the Wall Street Journal that specifically touted the iSeries to C-level executives. This is supposed to be repeated in other corporate-level magazines like Forbes and Fortune in the coming weeks.

Humph. Okay, fine, they published an advertisement. It's about time. Maybe, just *maybe*, we can forget about the burger-flipping nonsense. But still, we need more from IBM. We need IBM to help us, the little guys, and the vendors that built this box. We're tired of IBM pandering to the big guys. Java and SQL and Linux. Who needs 'em?

Well, there are two different issues here. First, IBM has opened up a number of initiatives to make available literally millions of dollars to SMBs and their ISVs. No longer are these programs reserved just for the big customers or the big vendors. Anybody with an iSeries product or a need for one can get in touch with IBM and get hooked up with a solution, or so they say.

And second, despite the grumbling, **you** need Java, and SQL, and maybe even Linux. Because if you want to compete, you're going to need those technologies. You're going to need to get to the Web, you're going to need to let the Web come to you, you're going to need to be able to provide ad hoc access to parts of your data. And that means new technologies. More importantly, this is what the kids know coming out of school, and if you intend on hiring new staff, you'll need the tools they know how to use.

Yeah, well that's the problem, isn't it? IBM just wants to take away my RPG and my green screen and my native I/O and turn my box into some kind of gussied up Microsoft video game. Pretty soon RPG will be gone and so will native I/O!

That's simply not true. RPG and native I/O are the core strengths of the iSeries, and IBM knows it. Heck, they've been dumping huge amounts of money into the RPG compiler. No, the education may not be there like it used to be, but then again, how many RPG programmers really learned it in college? And while there may not be a lot of IBM education, there's plenty of stuff on the web, including iSeries-specific stores like MCPressOnline, where you can find education.

So I have to learn all this stuff myself, huh?

Actually, I think the main thrust of the announcement was that IBM is going to help you find partners that can get you through this, and help those partners find you. Yes, it's a brave new world and a lot of new technology to learn and apply, but with the community pulling together, I think we have a shot at recapturing the best-of-breed predominance that the midrange held for so long in IT. Remember, the iSeries is the only box that provides both the legacy technologies of RPG and native I/O as well as all the new stuff, from PASE to Java to SQL. The problem was never which box is best, but how to sell it to the C-level executives. And now that IBM is committed to doing just that, we can concentrate on doing what we do best: writing killer applications!

Yeah. Well, still... back in my day, we didn't have fancy Java stuff.

We programmed in assembly language.

Sometimes we toggled the program in from the front panel.

In the snow. Uphill. Both ways...

Editors's final note: The Grumpy Old Programmer provides a certain point of view that all of us feel at one time or another. But in this editor's opinion, if IBM manages to accomplish just a third of what they are attempting, then this could be a very, very good year.
