



Business Recovery Begins at Home

I recently spent some time away with my family. I was having a conversation with a fellow tourist, comparing our jobs and all the troubles we left behind. My son overheard the conversation, and heard me say I was a disaster recovery planner. "Dad," he said, "we don't have disasters back home so your job must be boring!"

I started to explain that disaster recovery planning is all about being prepared for the unexpected and practicing so you always remain prepared. "What would happen if the lights went out at home?," I asked. My son replied "I'd get a flashlight." "OK," I said, "what if the power is out for hours and your parents are unreachable, and worse, the batteries are almost out." He looked at me and said, "I guess we have a disaster."

Should a family have a disaster recovery plan? Of course. Obviously, the plan wouldn't support a technological response but rather securing the human response. Historically, disaster recovery plans focused on technology (hot site) and data (back-up and off-site storage) with no attention to the people component. The assumption has always been made that any required staff would be available. In the business world, the biggest mistake a company can make is to focus on computer systems and ignore people. There is no business recovery without employees. Employees faced with conflicting obligations between the home and the workplace are less likely to cooperate during an emergency. Promoting family preparedness as part of the DRP is essential.

Creating Your Family DR Plan

A disaster can happen quickly and without warning. Your family could be scattered and separated, located at schools, work, home or gridlocked in traffic. How will you find each other? How will you determine if they are safe? Do you know what to do if services such as gas, water, electricity or telephones are unavailable? Emergency relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster, but they simply cannot reach everyone right away. As a family, you can survive a disaster by preparing in advance. Meet with your family and discuss why you need to prepare for disaster. Explain the dangers of disasters such as fire, severe weather, or an extended power outage. Explain the need to share responsibilities and safety as it involves a disaster. Discuss the types of disasters that are most likely to happen and explain what to do in each case.

Be sure to pick two places to meet:

- 1. Right outside your home in case of a sudden emergency, such as a fire.
- 2. A central location outside your neighborhood in case you can't return to your home.

Create a Checklist

Arrange for an out-of-state family member or friend to be your emergency contact. All family members should know to call this person during a major emergency and tell them where they are. Teach children how and when to call 911 for emergency help. Show each family member how and when to turn off the water, gas and electricity in your home. Teach each family member how to use the fire extinguisher and show them where it's kept.

Because I married into an Italian family, I can safely say that my household always has a 30-day food supply on hand or, in other words, a mini-Costco in our basement. You should do the same. There are six basics you should stock in your home:

Water - Store two quarts of bottled water per day per person.

Food - Store a supply of non-perishable food. Select foods that require no refrigeration, or preparation.

First Aid Supplies - Contact your local American Red Cross for a basic first aid manual.

Clothing - One complete change of clothing, rain gear, seasonal gear and shoes

Bedding - Blankets or sleeping bags, mini pop-up tents

Family Documents - Store in a bank safe deposit box versus in your home.

Keep enough of these supplies somewhere in your home to meet your needs for at least five days. Store them in sturdy, easy-to-carry containers such as backpacks, duffle bags or covered plastic moving containers.

Both the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) at www.fema.gov, and the American Red Cross at www.redcross.org have developed recommended family disaster plans. As with an IT disaster recovery plan (DRP), all facets of the family DRP must be tested. Be sure to periodically quiz your children so they remember what to do and where things are located. If you have young children, conduct a fire and home evacuation drill. Planning for disaster recovery is the responsibility of every corporation and family. The wise planner will build plans that place priority on people. Taking care of the needs of employees makes good sense and you will never be bored!
